30. Social Activist and Co-founder of The Chain Reaction Project

"I was a producer at Channel News Asia when I took part in Tour de Timor - a notoriously difficult 450km mountain bike race to promote peaceful social conditions in Timor-Leste (previously Indonesia's 27th province). Timor-Leste still bears sears from the Indonesian invasion in 1975, which had a death toll of almost 200,000 soldiers and civilians. The more we learnt about the significance of the race and the country, the more compelled we felt to use the biking adventure as a

platform for change. This race and the fund raising effort that followed led to the birth of The Chain Reaction Project, Along with my partners, we raise funds for causes in the world's least developed nations through adventures, from summitting Mt. Kilimanjaro for Tanzanian orphans to running marathons for underprivileged Cambodian students. We inspire others to join us in being catalysts for change as well. Thanks to our donors, we have since raised \$450,000 and counting!"

"Even though I come from a privileged background, my father made sure I knew I had to work hard for what I wanted. I only received rewards if I'd earned them, and these values made me down to earth. In the condominium where I grew up, the kids were very smart. I didn't do very well in school and it's natural for parents to compare. Even back then, I felt that I was missing out on

opportunities simply because I wasn't as elever or lacked paper qualifications. At that time, I told myself that if I could provide jobs for others, it would prevent people from having to feel as helpless and mept as I did. Passing judgement on a person's capabilities based on their qualifications, frankly, makes the world an ugly place. The first time we had a hearing impaired guest in our home, my dog treated him the same way he treated us and, in that moment, I realised that love truly knows no bounds. People shouldn't be judged by their disabilities, mistakes or unfortunate circumstances, because everyone deserves a second chance."
